So the locomotive itself hasn't seen a new coat of paint in over 20 years or so. Paint was coming off the boiler, the side rods, anything you can think of paint was peeling off the engine. And since it was turning 110 years old and having a night photo shoot in November, we needed to make it look better than it did.

So we started working on it. We decided to give it a nice light grey paint on the smokebox and smoke stack. Once that was done we painted the hand rails, cowcatcher, number plate, and the headlight with a new coat of black paint. Then we painted the side rods with the light grey paint to make it stand out.

And then the big day came for the locomotive. It was almost ready for the night photo shoot. But we decided to do something special with the engine. We gave the locomotive back its original number 31 that it hasn't seen in 47 years when the locomotive was pulling freight trains for the Woodward Iron Company (1912-1962) and the Rockton & Rion Railroad (1962-1967) before coming to the Okefenokee Heritage Center.





And then later that night, the locomotive looked better than it ever did in the past few years. During the photo shoot we took some photos of the engine with its original number with smoke machines to make it look like it was back in operation and then we returned the number nine back to the locomotive. Definitely been a lot of hard work on this locomotive but we definitely had a lot of fun














My name is Zane Williams, I'm 19 years old and was born and raised in Lyons, Georgia.








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

It's about Television • Eddie Dryden

First time I saw a TV set was in 1954. i was 13,14 years old. Seeing people moving, talking, in a box was amazing to me. I decided then that was for me. Television's started out very small. You buy a TV, approximately 19 inches in a cabinet 3 feet wide and 3 feet deep. The cost was around \$600.00. A few years later, screens got bigger and cabinets got smaller and the prices came down.

I started working on TVs in 1956. I made some service calls to customer's houses where I carried a tube caddy with about 12 different tubes. I could repair your set for less thatn \$10.00. Tubes \$3.00-4.00 and service call was \$3.00.

Around 1958sets got bigger screen size of 23 or 25 inches. New color TV's came on the market. Back to large TV cabinets with higher prices. Sets that were made by RCA, Zenith, Sylvania, Philco, and Magnavox. All had the same 25 inch round picture tube made by RCA. The costs of the sets were around \$600.00. Now Motorola spent 6 million dollars to make a rectangular tube. The problem was in the corners of the tube to make 3 pictures align with each other into one picture. With color sets youhave a red, green, and blue screen (RGB) that set mixes in one Black and White screen. The most common was a 23 inch screen.

Prices of sets now dropped back to \$200.00. Everybody now could afford to buy a color TV. All TV manufacturers held training sessions on how to repair their sets. Other TV repair shops did not want to go to the training. They would call me when they had a problem. As times goes by all TV repair shops in Waycross went out of business. I was the last shop in southeast Georgia. Valdosta, Savannah, and Jacksonville were the only places outside of Waycross.

Now digital screen TVs were the latest screens that got bigger, as prices went back up, the cost to repair equal to buying a new set.




Customers would bring their sets in to be repaired. I would tell them it would be cheaper to buy a new set than to repair. So after a couple of years, I closed my shop. No one could get their sets repaired in Waycross. I have people ask me do you still work on TV's? Nope. TV repair went out of style 15 or 20 years ago, Today digital screens are like little computers. You can do nearly everything with them.

Eddie is married to June. They have 3 children and spouses: Carol Ann and Barry Braddock, Keith and Sharman Dryden, Chris and Angie Dryden, and 12 grandchildren.

Dr. Tanner currently serves as SGSC's vice president for advancement, government relations and athletics, and first came to what was then South Georgia College in 2012 as dean of students.






I am delighted to present my Fashion & Romantic Artistic Expression series to a new audience here in the Southeast.



An Infantryman who has taken part in the invasions of Africa, Sicily and France and who has just returned to this country from lines in Germany believes that the worst fighting in Europe is yet to come.

The veteran Doughboy, Private 1st Class Euell Deal, of Patterson, Georgia, spent two years and five months overseas with the 1st Infantry Division. He was given a 30-day furlough in this country under the now War Department policy of furloughing as many men as possible who have two or more decorations or wounds, and who otherwise qualify for rotation.

Interviewed at Camp Shanks, Orangeburg, New York where he was processed before his furlough, Private Deal told how German resistance gradually stiffened as the Americans drove them back in Europe and across their own frontiers. "We thought the invasion of Africa was tough", Private Deal said, "And then Sicily came along and we thought that was even worse. But D-day, June 6th in Normandy was the worse invasion of them all. And the Germans kept getting tougher.


"We Infantrymen, the only troops that actually came face to face with the Jerries, knows that the fighting gets rougher all the time, the farther back we push them".

The Infantrymen was a member of headquarters company unit and was at Stolberg, Germany on December 7 when he was ordered back home on furlough. Private Deal has the Purple Heart and Oak Leaf Cluster for two battle wounds.

His first wound was received on the beach at Normandy on D-day when shell fragments struck him in the chin. Again he was wounded on August 1, by a bomb fragment during a German air raid near St. Lo.

For his meritorious service in setting up a command post under fire on D-day, Private Deal holds a Bronze Star Medal. He received his basic training at the Infantry Replacement Training Center, Camp Wheeler, Georgia.

He planned to spend a furlough at the home of a brother, L. E. Deal Of Patterson.





Euell Calvin Deal was born September 29, 1919, in Appling County. He was the ninth son born to Calvin Columbus "C.C." "Lummie" and Mabel Lee Deal. His father later married Terresa Bowen Deal. His mother, Mabel, died of pneumonia in December 1919.

He grew up with his brothers, Lovin, Albert, Garlan, Jasper "Jack," Leary, Darwin, Rollie, Tera, Allison, and Gilbert "Lum," and his only sister, Lavon Deal Williamson.

As he reached adulthood, he joined the U.S. Army and served in the European Theater during World War II. He received several medals during his service, including the Purple Heart.

After the war, he married Essie Mae Johnson Deal (later Ward) (1931-2011), and they had two daughters, Jean Deal DeLong (born in 1948) and Debbie Deal Cooler (born in 1952).

Euell worked several jobs during his lifetime, including as a fuel truck driver for a busi-



ness in Waycross owned by his cousin-inlaw, Tracy Everett, as a service station manager for Walker Oil Company in Jesup and retired as a civil service employee, having worked for the United States Post Office in Savannah.

He was a member of the Lake Chapel Primitive Baptist Church near Patterson, where he delighted to give Juicy Fruit chewing gum to the youngsters at church.

He also was a gifted writer, composing

poems about various subjects.

Later in life, he married Mary Winn Rozier (later Moore) (1930-2001). Euell died November 30, 1978, at the Wayne Memorial Hospital in Jesup, after a long illness. He was 59. Euell's brother Tera was Jerald Deal's father. Tera (1916-1999) married Edith Carter (1919-1985) and they had Jerald, Lindon, Russell Bloyce, Terry, Curtis and Rickey.

He was buried at the Lake Chapel Cemetery in Appling County.

George Vining is a Waycross native whose passion for flying remote control aircraft started in 1988 after he found his dad's old SIG Kadet, a 3-channel RC airplane, sitting dusty and tucked away in the crawl space entrance of his childhood home. His uncle, Jerry Lee, helped him get it flyable again, and after a few lessons from Keith Douglas, a family friend and well-known pilot in the RC community, young George was flying the Kadet on his own in no time.

Over the years, the chance to fly would wax and wane; he would slip into a flight here and there whenever he got the opportunity. An even older love of George's is painting and drawing. He was always doodling on paper with different mediums, so George's parents enrolled him in art lessons at ten years old, where he learned to draw and paint using pastels, acrylics, and watercolor. He studied under the watchful eye of well-known artist and owner of The Pallet Shop, Ruth Collins, until age 15.

Most of George's paintings from back then are vibrant in color.

Trading in the paintbrush for technical drawing skills, George graduated from Okefenokee Technical Institute in '96 with a diploma in mechanical and architectural drafting. He continues in this career field, drawing and designing mechanical systems and architectural drawings in various CAD (Computer Aided Design) programs.

George became interested in digital photography some years ago as another hobby. He read several books on the subject, watched videos on different techniques, and experimented with photography. He was finding himself yet again chasing the color-rich issues, taking pictures, and experimenting with different camera settings and effects every chance he got.

In 2019, his wife Rena (who he always credits with being more intelligent than him) bought him his first camera drone.
